



The progression of writing at The Mill Academy.

Each of our writing units will start with a model text, which will demonstrate the year group specific skills and new rich and adventurous vocabulary (including figurative language where appropriate). Children will explore the text type in depth during the first lesson of the writing cycle, which may include: discussions around authorial intent, how atmosphere is created, how the audience is addressed etc.

Children will then be taught specific skills as outlined below, which will also be applied, in context, to independent writing within literacy lessons. During the writing cycle, children will also be provided with opportunities (where appropriate) for speaking and listening, drama and role play.

Throughout the year, children will develop their drafting and editing skills and will produce a finished piece (either written or performed) for each writing cycle. Editing and re-publishing may include revisiting pieces from earlier in the year to apply new skills learned.

Thought and consideration will be given to the planning and delivery of writing to ensure children are exposed to exciting, engaging text types which have a clear audience and purpose.
